Why Study Prayer?

As humans, we tend to do whatever it is that we want, and avoid doing those things that we do not want to do.

What is it about us that makes it so likely that we will avoid spending time in prayer?

We have been invited to speak directly to the God of the entire universe, the One who holds all things together, the One who has the power to bring about any outcome.

What is it about us that makes us take this privilege for granted, or to think of prayer as something we should do only because God wants us to do it?

What We Need In Order to Study Prayer?

1. A Genuine Desire to Learn:

"Come to Me, all who are weary and heavy-laden, and I will give you rest. Take My yoke upon you, and learn from Me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you shall find rest for your souls."

2. Purity of Heart:

"Therefore, putting aside all malice and all guile and hypocrisy and envy and all slander, like newborn babes, long for the pure milk of the word, that by it you may grow in respect to salvation."

What We Need In Order to Study Prayer?

3. A Realignment of Our Perspective:

"But as many as received Him, to them He gave the right to become children of God, even to those who believe in His name."

- 1 James 4:17


But What About the Difficulty of Prayer?


