Should we simply accept that God allows suffering because we have all sinned?

- Maybe.

Do we have the right to complain about suffering?

- Depends on what we mean by "right."

We all understand the idea of "good verses evil." Should this idea be changed to "good through evil"?

In part.

Why doesn't God do more to stop suffering?

- We don't know how much suffering He prevents
- If He stopped some suffering, where would that end?
- To eliminate suffering is to eliminate sin/consequence

Why doesn't God do more to punish evil?

- God actively punishes evil, but . . .
- God has reserved ultimate judgment and punishment

We all understand the idea of "good verses evil." Should this idea be changed to "good through evil"?

- In part.

If God knows what will happen, why is God not culpable for the evil or suffering that takes place?

- Knowing something will happen does not make God culpable for the fact that we chose to do it.
- Allowing something to happen does not make God culpable for the fact that we chose to do it.
- God allows us freedom to choose evil.
- God rarely* acts to overwhelm our choice.
- God's moral will can be thwarted.
- God's overall sovereign will cannot be thwarted.

Is it wrong for us to simply accept that God allows evil without knowing why?

No, but . . . for the sake of others: 1 Peter 3:15

Your attitude should be the same as that of Christ Jesus:
Who, being in very nature God,
did not consider equality with God something to be grasped,
but made himself nothing,
taking the very nature of a servant,
being made in human likeness.

My prayer is not for them alone. I pray also for those who will believe in me through their message, that all of them may be one, Father, just as you are in me and I am in you. May they also be in us so that the world may believe that you have sent me. I have given them the glory that you gave me, that they may be one as we are one: I in them and you in me. May they be brought to complete unity to let the world know that you sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me. Father, I want those you have given me to be with me where I am, and to see my glory, the glory you have given me because you loved me before the creation of the world.

- 2. Let us be willing to be silent and present in support of those who suffer, and to love to the point of laying down our life for others.

When Job's three friends . . . heard about all the troubles that had come upon him, they set out from their homes and met together by agreement to go and sympathize with him and comfort him. . . . Then they sat on the ground with him for seven days and seven nights. No one said a word to him, because they saw how great his suffering was.

Job 2:11, 13

- 1. Let us be humble and very hesitant to ascribe a reason for suffering.
- 2. Let us be willing to be silent and present in support of those who suffer, and to love to the point of laying down our life for others.
- 3. Let us not be passive in accepting evil and suffering.
- 4. Let us be careful not to recreate God into our own image.
- 5. Let us help to reconstruct and not simply deconstruct.
- 6. Let us be thankful for every gift in this life the Lord has given, and to enjoy His present grace and mercy.
- 7. Let us keep in mind that this world is not our home.

Therefore we do not lose heart. Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day.

For our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all. So we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen. For what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal.

Now we know that if the earthly tent we live in is destroyed, we have a building from God, an eternal house in heaven, not built by human hands. Meanwhile we groan, longing to be clothed with our heavenly dwelling, because when we are clothed, we will not be found naked. For while we are in this tent, we groan and are burdened, because we do not wish to be unclothed but to be clothed with our heavenly dwelling, so that what is mortal may be swallowed up by life. Now it is God who has made us for this very purpose and has given us the Spirit as a deposit, guaranteeing what is to come.

2 Corinthians 4:16 – 5:5

7. Let us keep in mind that this world is not our home.
