"Again, it will be like a man going on a journey, who called his servants and entrusted his property to them. To one he gave five talents of money, to another two talents, and to another one talent, each according to his ability. Then he went on his journey.

The man who had received the five talents went at once and put his money to work and gained five more. So also, the one with the two talents gained two more. But the man who had received the one talent went off, dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money.

"His master replied, 'You wicked, lazy servant! So you knew that I harvest where I have not sown and gather where I have not scattered seed? Well then, you should have put my money on deposit with the bankers, so that when I returned I would have received it back with interest.

"Take the talent from him and give it to the one who has the ten talents. For everyone who has will be given more, and he will have an abundance. Whoever does not have, even what he has will be taken from him. And throw that worthless servant outside, into the darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth."

Freedom and Stewardship

The Lessons of The Parable of the Talents

- The Master is the one who provides the money to the stewards.
- The Master expects us to invest what He has given us, and to produce a return on that investment.
- I The Master gives different amounts, each according to their ability, but we are expected to invest what we currently have.
- The Master gives us <u>freedom</u> of where and how to invest, along with <u>responsibility</u> for the choices we make. The Master comes to make account with us at the end of the age.
- The entire investment, what He gives to us, and what we make with it, belongs to the Master. Everything is to be used for the Master's purpose.

In the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, we command you, brothers, to keep away from every brother who is idle and does not live according to the teaching you received from us. For you yourselves know how you ought to follow our example. We were not idle when we were with you, nor did we eat anyone's food without paying for it. With great power the apostles continued to testify to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and much grace was upon them all. There were no needy persons among them.
