- 1. Prayer, Worship, Proclamation and Teaching of the Scriptures so that the whole body may attain full maturity in Christ. (Eph. 4:11-13; Acts 2:42-47; Rom. 10:14)
- 2. Expression of Spiritual Gifts (1 Cor. 12-14)
- **3.** Participation with God to carry out God's mission in the world (2 Cor. 5:16-21; Eph. 2:8-10)
- 4. Love for One Another (1 Peter 2:17; 4:8; Gal. 6:2, 10)
- 5. Sacraments, especially Communion and Baptism (Matt. 26; 28:18-20)
- 6. Church Discipline (Matt. 18:15-20; 1 Cor. 5:1-12)





**IS EXODUS A CHURCH?** 

We might be close, but:

We are not pastorally-led or pastorally-oriented;

We have not engaged church discipline and authority;

We are strong in teaching and equipping, covenant community and we are growing in service, but have not emphasized exhortation (proclamation) and we lack focus on evangelism and deeping/multiplying discipleship.



Should the pastor have some sort of authority over the lives of the people at the church?

What are the most significant qualifications for a local pastor? What should his responsibilities be?

If the church is really necessary, why is there a need for membership?

Is it healthy to have a set of group leaders or should the church be run by members?



Should clergy be paid? Why or why not?

I understand certain compensation for work done, but in today's age, at least when it comes to U.S. based "missionaries" and "pastors," is it necessary to have them fully-sponsored financially? What benefit does this present to the church as a whole?



"The elders who direct the affairs of the church well are worthy of double honor, especially those whose work is preaching and teaching. For Scripture says, "Do not muzzle an ox while it is treading out the grain," and "The worker deserves his wages." Do not entertain an accusation against an elder unless it is brought by two or three witnesses. But those elders who are sinning you are to reprove before everyone, so that the others may take warning. I charge you, in the sight of God and Christ Jesus and the elect angels, to keep these instructions without partiality, and to do nothing out of favoritism."

"Was it a sin for me to lower myself in order to elevate you by preaching the gospel of God to you free of charge? I robbed other churches by receiving support from them so as to serve you. And when I was with you and needed something, I was not a burden to anyone, for the brothers who came from Macedonia supplied what I needed. I have kept myself from being a burden to you in any way, and will continue to do so."

"Because we loved you so much, we were delighted to share with you not only the gospel of God but our lives as well. Surely you remember, brothers and sisters, our toil and hardship; we worked night and day in order not to be a burden to anyone while we preached the gospel of God to you. You are witnesses, and so is God, of how holy, righteous and blameless we were among you who believed."

"In the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, we command you, brothers and sisters, to keep away from every believer who is idle and disruptive and does not live according to the teaching you received from us. For you yourselves know how you ought to follow our example. We were not idle when we were with you, nor did we eat anyone's food without paying for it. On the contrary, we worked night and day, laboring and toiling so that we would not be a burden to any of you. We did this, not because we do not have the right to such help, but in order to offer ourselves as a model for you to imitate. For even when we were with you, we gave you this rule: "The one who is unwilling to work shall not eat."

#### **The Local Church Has Always Been The Plan**

- 1. Jesus Inaugurated the Church\* (Matt. 16:17-18);
- 2. Jesus Chooses to Demonstrate His Power and Wisdom through the Church\* (Eph. 3:10);
- **3.** The Church\* is the Body of Christ in the World (Eph. 1:23);
- 4. Many expressions of the Church\* can only take place in the context of the local church.
- 5. Paul's example of forming churches focused entirely on the local church.



#### **Challenges for American Christians:**

- **1.** Worship is stale: the "same old same old";
- 2. Evangelicals are watering own their theological beliefs;
- **3.** Evangelical congregations are split demographically into all-white, all-black or all-Hispanic churches (John adds: all-Asian);
- 4. Many Christians, especially younger ones, don't take the Bible seriously, especially on issues such as divorce and premarital sex;
- 5. Christianity in America does not cost anything;
- 6. Any expression of the supernatural has been excised from Sunday worship;
- 7. No one is ready for the fact that Gen Y Christians are going to radically reinvent the church;
- 8. U.S. churches tend to compete rather than cooperate;
- 9 There is a dearth of good leaders. Those who fill America's pulpits are teachers, but not leaders with vision (John adds: and not preachers);



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
