Are you still saved during periods of doubt?




How can I be sure I am saved (x 5)?

Is salvation more about a posture of the heart rather than holding certain ideas or doing certain things?

Is effort required on my part for salvation, or is it a matter of surrender?



If salvation is through faith / relationship with Jesus, what about all the people before Jesus' time on earth?

Are there levels of salvation? Are there steps that need to be taken to better understand the fullness of salvation?

Is salvation an event or a process?

What is the proper understanding of "belief."

What does Paul mean about the "right" gospel in 1 Cor. 15:2?

What about the fact that we are not on a "level playing field" when it comes to our understanding of salvation, especially with regard to our personal and environmental differences?



Did something literally happen (physically or metaphysically) when Christ died, or was it symbolic?

How does salvation pertain to knowing Jesus relationally?

What is salvation? I think of its as going to heaven vs. hell.

Faith or works? In what proportion? What's the simplest way to explain this?

Is there legitimate scriptural precedent for a doctrine of "mortal sin?"

What levels or distinctions exist between the types of being "saved," "inheriting life," etc.



SalvationThree Tenses of Salvation

Past Tense:

"For if, while we were God's enemies, we were reconciled to him through the death of his Son, how much more, having been reconciled, shall we be saved?" (Romans 5:10)

"For in this hope we were saved." (Romans 8:24a)

"...it is by grace you have been saved." (Ephesians 2:5b)



Salvation Three Tenses of Salvation

Past Tense:

"For if, while we were God's enemies, we were reconciled to him through the death of his Son, how much more, having been reconciled, shall we be saved?" (Romans 5:10)

"For in this hope we were saved." (Romans 8:24a)

"...it is by grace you have been saved." (Ephesians 2:5b)

Present Tense: "For the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God." (1 Corinthians 1:18)

> "For we are to God the pleasing aroma of Christ among those who are being saved and those who are perishing." (2 Corinthians 2:15)



SalvationThree Tenses of Salvation

Future Tense:

"If you declare with your mouth, "Jesus is Lord," and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved." (Romans 10:9)

"This is a sign to them that they will be destroyed, but that you will be saved — and that by God." (Philippians 1:28b)

Justification

Right legal standing before God

Sanctification

Becoming more like Christ / more holy

Glorification

Receiving a resurrection body / becoming like Christ, eternity with God



SalvationOrdering Salvation

Election God's choice of who to save

Calling Proclamation of the Gospel message

Regeneration Being born again (becoming spiritually alive)

Conversion Putting faith in Christ and repenting from sin

Justification Right legal standing before God

Adoption Becoming a son or daughter and heir of God

Sanctification Becoming more like Christ / more holy

Perseverance Remaining a Christian

Death Going to be with the Lord

Glorification Receiving a resurrection body / becoming like Christ, eternity with God



SalvationOrdering Salvation

For he **chose** us in him before the creation of the world to be holy and blameless in his sight. In love he **predestined** us for adoption to sonship through Jesus Christ, in accordance with his pleasure and will — to the praise of his glorious grace, which he has freely given us in the One he loves. . . . In him we were also **chosen**, having been **predestined** according to the plan of him who works out everything in conformity with the purpose of his will, in order that we, who were the first to put our hope in Christ, might be for the praise of his glory.

- Ephesians 1:4-6, 11-12

And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose. For those God foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son, that he might be the firstborn among many brothers and sisters. And those he predestined, he also called; those he called, he also justified; those he justified, he also glorified.
