Taking Your Faith Private





Stigma -

An attribute, behavior or reputation which is socially discrediting, causing an individual to be labeled as a deviant from the norm.

Stigma is societally enforced.

Prejudice -

A preconceived (often unfounded) judgment towards persons because of gender, social class, race, ethnicity, religion, nationality, etc.

Passing -

A cultural performance where a member of a stigmatized group acts in a way to avoid the stigma associated with that group, including: (1) fabrication, (2) concealment, (3) avoidance.

Stigma:

Christians are socially discrediting, causing a pressure to conform to the norm, or at least avoid deviating from the norm.

Secularization: An effort to transform society from close identification with religious values and institutions towards nonreligious values and secular institutions.

Leads to:

A belief in dualism, where our public lives are devoid of religious expression, and any religious beliefs are kept strictly private.

Paul's calling to preach:

"I urge, then, first of all that requests, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for everyone-for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness. This is good, and pleases God our Savior, who wants all men to be saved and to come to a knowledge of the truth. For there is one God and one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus, who gave himself as a ransom for all men-the testimony given in its proper time. And for this purpose I was appointed a herald and an apostle-I am telling the truth, I am not lying-and a teacher of the truth faith to the Gentiles" 1 Timothy 2:1-7



Paul's eagerness to preach:

"I am obligated both to Greeks and non-Greeks, both to the wise and to the foolish. That is why I am so eager to preach the gospel also to you who are in Rome.

I am not ashamed of the gospel, because it is the power of God for the salvation of everyone; first for the Jew, then for the Gentile. For in the gospel a righteousness from God is revealed, a righteousness that is by faith from first to last, just as it is written: 'the righteous will live by faith.'"

Romans 1:14-17



Paul commands believers to preach:

"You must teach what is in accord with sound doctrine...
In everything set them a good example by doing what is good. In your teaching show integrity, seriousness and soundness of speech that cannot be condemned, so that those who oppose you may be ashamed because they have nothing bad to say about us."

Titus 2:1, 7-8



Paul commands believers to preach:

"Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has gone, the new has come! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation: that God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting men's sins against them. And he has committed to us the message of reconciliation. We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us. We implore you on Christ's behalf: Be reconciled to God. God made him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God."

2 Corinthians 5:17-21



Jesus instructed disciples to preach:

"When you enter a house, first say, 'Peace to this house.' If a man of peace is there, your peace will rest on him; if not, it will return to you. Stay in that house, eating and drinking whatever they give you, for the worker deserves his wages. Do not move around from house to house.

When you enter a town and are welcomed, eat what is set before you. Heal the sick who are there, and tell them, 'The kingdom of God is near you.'"

Jesus instructed disciples to preach:

"Then the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain where Jesus had told them to go. When they saw him, they worshipped him; but some doubted. Then Jesus came to them and said, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age.'"
